Ethel will enter Douglass College in the Fall with a State Scholarship. She has received the College Club Scholarship, Girls Citizenship Award at Douglass, attended the Citizenship Institute at Rutgers, was Junior Red Cross and Canuck Science Club member and president of the Future Teachers of America Club.
